SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

IAOPA

The International Council of Aircraft Owner and Pilot Associations (IAOPA) is a nonprofit federation of 79 autonomous, nongovernmental, national general aviation organizations. IAOPA has represented international general aviation for more than 65 years.

Overall, the various associations that make up IAOPA have greatly increased the awareness of their respective government authorities and the public as to the nature and needs of general aviation. Constructive contacts with national authorities have been most productive and have been encouraged throughout by the activities of the IAOPA organization.

In order to assist the national organizations in this effort, IAOPA has produced a set of guidelines and helpful hints for use by the various national groups in how to best work with their national authorities.

There is strong evidence that the efforts of IAOPA and its constituent groups have produced a growing recognition and respect for general aviation in the general public, and international bodies as well as within the national governments of many States.

The IAOPA World Assembly is held once every two years in order to bring affiliates together to discuss worldwide issues facing general aviation. The 29th Annual World Assembly will be from March 25th-19th, 2018 in Queenstown, New Zealand. History

The Canadian Owners and Pilots Association was founded in 1952 to speak as the unified voice for general aviation in Canada. Since then, COPA has grown to meet the ever-changing needs of the Canadian aviation community. The COPA Flight Safety Foundation, founded in 1973 to promote flight safety in the field of general aviation, collects donations from across the country to sponsor the COPA Flight Safety Bulletin and other safety-related initiatives.

Due to the wide variety of challenges and obstacles faced by the general aviation community, COPA created a fund to solicit contributions which are used to fund legal actions at all levels and projects of national importance vital to the future of general aviation. To date, the COPA Freedom to Fly Fund has provided more than \$1.3 million to secure general aviation's future in Canada.

COPA is also active at the grassroots level, with over 200 regional and local chapters which constitute the COPA Flights. The first flight was formed in Guelph in 1964 and today the program boasts flights in every province and two territories. The COPA Flights are an essential component to the success of the COPA for Kids program which introduces over 3,000 Canadian children to general aviation each year and is a vital component of our collective outreach and promotion within the broader community.

Through the Neil Armstrong Scholarship Program, COPA members and friends of former member Neil Armstrong provide scholarship funds each year to help worthy candidates offset the costs of flight training. Neil Armstrong was a pilot, air service operator, COPA director, writer and friend. Through his legacy, Canadian youth are being welcomed into the general aviation community and keeping alive the spirit and the dedication that Neil Armstrong embodied.

Today we are proud to represent close to 16,000 members in every province and territory who recognize the need for strong, effective representation. COPA's heritage is an important part of our identity as a community and the same vision that led to our organizations founding in 1952 guides us to this day as we continue to advance, promote, and preserve the Canadian freedom to fly.



Montréal is close to the heavily populated American east coast and is a gateway city for international travellers from Europe. Just 20 minutes from the city centre (20 kilometers or 12 miles), Montréal-Trudeau International Airport makes getting to Montréal a breeze with over 200 flights arriving daily. Current transportation costs to the downtown core are fixed at Can\$40 for a taxicab and Can\$10 for the shuttle bus (ticket valid for 24-hours on entire public transit network).

Montréal is also serviced by Amtrak and Via Rail and our city's central station is located downtown, within walking distance from all hotels.

Once in Montréal, your attendees will mostly use the green and orange subway (metro) lines as well as the main bus routes that service the downtown core. In addition to these traditional modes of transportation, Montréal offers a public sharing bike system called BIXI (a contraction of the words Blcycle and taXI).

It is important to keep in mind that Montréal is a human-scale walkable city. Its city center is compact and all is within walking distance.



- / Green architecture and responsible consumption: Home to the first residential building in North America to receive Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Platinum accreditation, Montréal also displays avant-garde eco practices through its commercial architecture. Over 80 commercial buildings proudly display their green status.
- / Energy efficiency: The Palais des congrès de Montréal's extensive commitment to green practices has been recognized with several awards, joining major companies noted for their leadership and outstanding energy efficiency performance.
- / Green accommodations: Fairmont the Queen Elizabeth, Le Centre Sheraton and Le Westin Montréal have each earned a 4 Green Key Eco-Rating from the Hotel Association of Canada.
- Community involvement: the Community Kindness Program implemented by Tourisme Montréal and the Palais des congrès offers a great way to give while reducing waste. Many event organizers seize the opportunity to donate unused trade show materials (e.g. paper, pens, T-shirts) to three local charities.

Go cycling, golfing or swimming in summer, and skating, skiing or sledding in winter. Watch Canadiens hockey, Alouettes football and Impact soccer. Explore the world at the Biodôme, Insectarium and Planetarium at the Space for Life and at the Ecomuseum Zoo and the Science Centre. Or go to extremes at La Ronde amusement park, SOS Labyrinth, zip-lining, surfing the rapids, rock climbing and more.

THE MONTREAL MUSEUM OF FINE ARTS

The MMFA's exhibitions are renowned for a multidisciplinary approach that combines the fine arts with music, film, fashion, and design. The museum's permanent collection, presented in five pavilions, features international art (including an impressive collection of Old Masters), world cultures, decorative arts and design, a sculpture garden, Québec and Canadian art, and a significant selection of Inuit art. The complex is also home to an acclaimed concert hall graced with 20 Tiffany stained-glass windows.

Notre-Dame Basilica of Montréal

A masterpiece of Gothic Revival architecture, Notre-Dame Basilica was built between 1824 and 1829. The magnificent interior in wood and the boldly modern design of the Notre-Dame-du- Sacré-Coeur Chapel, captivate hundreds of thousands of visitors each year. Paintings, sculptures and stained-glass windows illustrate biblical passages as well as 350 years of parish history.

Promenade Fleuve-Montagne

As a legacy of Montréal's 375th anniversary, this 3,8 km urban promenade connects two emblematic sites: the St. Lawrence River and Mount Royal. Interspersed with plants, resting spots, explanatory panels and public artworks, the route invites walkers to discover the history, heritage, landscapes, and cultural peculiarities of the city through a succession of streets and public spaces.

Neighbourhood Streets

Laurier Avenue is knowned for its restaurants, gourmet food shops and the speciality boutiques that teem with exclusive designer apparel, accessories, original furnishings, children's clothing, and toys. Bernard Avenue, located in a residential and business zone of Outremont, hosts turn-of-the-century architecture housing restaurants and design boutiques. Du Parc Avenue, since the 1950s, has been the home of the Greek community, its restaurants, and pastry shops. Alongside du Parc Avenue lies Jeanne- Mance Park, named in honour of the founder of Montréal's first hospital, Hôtel-Dieu de Montréal. 



BY TRAIN

VIA Rail operates Canada's national passenger rail service and provides a safe, cost-effective and environmentally responsible service from coast to coast. The VIA Rail network extends 12,500 km, serving over 400 communities across Canada with over 500 trains weekly. AMTRAK also serves Montréal with a daily service to and from New York City.



BY BUS

The centrally-located Montréal Coach Terminal, *Gare d'autocars de Montréal*, is the departure and arrival point of most inter-city buses as well as the airport shuttle. It is conveniently connected to the subway system at the Berri-UQAM station and linked to the 32 km of Underground City where visitors enjoy quick and easy access to hotels, restaurants, stores, tourist attractions and more.

BY CAR

American visitors or international visitors transiting through the United States will love driving North to Montréal via Interstates 87 and 89. Located just 60 km (29 miles) from the U.S. border, Montréal is easily accessible by highway with many roads and expressways leading to the city.



BY CRUISE LINES

There are several marinas located on the St. Lawrence River. Just minutes from downtown with 130 berths at the Quays of the Old Port of Montréal, the *Port d'escale* is a favourite, for its spectacular views and easy access to Old Montréal. Other Montréal marinas include the new 205-slip public marina of the Montréal Yacht Club which offers exceptional installations for seasonal members and transient boaters.

Many cruise lines also use Montréal as a starting or ending point for their itineraries along the St. Lawrence River at the award-winning Port of Montréal. One of nine ports of call along the seaway, Montréal is a major embarkation and disembarkation port. It is a starting point for the Canada/New England route, and the beginning and end point for travel to and from Europe, as well as to and from the Îles de la Madeleine. Montréal welcomes over 70,000 cruise passengers every year.

PASSPORTS AND VISAS

All visitors require a valid passport to enter Canada. The less expensive passport card (for land border crossings or sea ports-of-entry from the United States only) are also accepted. Canadian citizens or permanent residents of Canada or U.S citizens travelling with a valid Canadian passport or a permanent resident card or a U.S passport can use Automated Border Clearance (ABC) self-serve kiosks when they arrive at Montreal-Pierre Elliott Trudeau International Airport to avoid long lines. NEW ENTRY REQUIREMENT (MARCH 15, 2016)

Canada has introduced a new entry requirement, known as the Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA), for visa-exempt foreign nationals who fly to Canada. This regulation becomes mandatory March 15, 2016. Exceptions include U.S. citizens and travellers with a valid visa

The eTA is electronically linked to your passport and is valid for five years or until your passport expires. Applying for an eTA is a simple and inexpensive (\$7 CAD) online process that will take just a few minutes. Most eTA-eligible applicants will get their authorization within minutes of submitting the online form.

GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT CANADIAN CUSTOMS

The Canada Border Services Agency has developed streamlined border procedures and services to assist meeting planners and convention organizers in holding their meeting in Canada. With over \$2 billion in trade passing through the Canada-U.S. Border every day, Montréal is a destination fully capable of handling large shipments of material from the U.S. and around the world.

Canada Customs makes it possible for your material to clear customs following its arrival in Montréal. The onsite customs facility clears convention goods at the show rather than at the border, ensuring that your goods are not delayed when they arrive in Canada.

As well, the Palais des congrès, Montréal's convention centre, is considered "in bond" by Canada Customs and acts as a customs clearance point. You can obtain official recognition status for your event and avoid paying duties and taxes.

Foreign organizations are permitted to import certain goods into Canada for use at meetings without paying customs duty and tax (subject to a security deposit typically handled by your customs broker). In order to qualify for the Foreign Organization Remission Order, a foreign organization must have its head offices outside of Canada. Furthermore, the meeting must not be open to the general public, and Canadian attendance should not exceed 25%.


Exemption from custom duty and taxes is then granted on the following: convention material imported for free distribution to persons attending the meeting or conference, advertising material and souvenirs (valued at no more than \$25 CAD each) imported for free distribution to attendees and audio-visual equipment and office machines that are imported for use at the meeting or convention (on condition that this equipment is exported at the conclusion of the meeting).

"Official paraphernalia" (goods bearing the official logo of the Association) may be sold by the Association to attendees provided the event is not open to the public and the goods are valued at no more than \$25 CAD.

Your staff members do not require work permits.

Guest speakers do not require work permits to address your delegates but should be provided with a letter of introduction from your association.

Personal computers, tape recorders and the like may be brought into Canada by delegates and speakers alike, provided it is for their personal use.

CANADA CUSTOMS AND THE CANADIAN BORDER SERVICES AGENCY (CBSA)

The Canadian government, in an effort to encourage groups to hold their meetings in Canada, has made provisions to ensure trouble-free events.

A Convention Services Program was designed by the CBSA with the help of other government agencies in order to facilitate planning events in Canada.

The CBSA offers a variety of event coordination services including:

- Liaison with CBSA authorities, both nationally or regionally and functionally or operationally on any admissibility requirements.
- Provision of support and guidance in your communication with, and collaboration between, other Canadian government agencies.
- Assistance in determining eligibility for the remission of duties and taxes.
- Integration into Canada's International Events and Convention Services Program and customs broker services

- / Determination of entitlements to the national courtesy and expedited clearance program.
- / Help with ensuring CBSA ports of entry (POE) personnel are able to achieve a level of operational readiness for your event's entrance into Canada in order to handle the arrivals in a timely and effective manner.
- Continuous functional guidance based on extensive experience and precedence.

To obtain customs privileges for your event, simply write to the CBSA office in Montréal, advising them of your intent to hold an event in Montréal. Three to six months prior to the event is suggested or a year prior if exhibits are featured. CBSA reply will advise which privileges have been extended to you. Sample letters for event recognition are available from Canada Customs or your customs broker.

TAX REBATES

FOREIGN CONVENTIONS REBATE PROGRAM

You can claim up to 100% of your taxes (currently at 5% GST & 9.975% QST) when you meet the criteria listed below.

NON-RESIDENT SPONSORS OR NON-REGISTERED ORGANIZERS OF FOREIGN CONVENTIONS

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

A foreign convention is a convention where:

- / non-residents of Canada account for at least 75% of the admissions to the event
- / the sponsor of the convention is a non-resident of Canada

WHO CAN CLAIM A REBATE?

A rebate of the Goods and Services Taxes (GST) and the Quebec Sales Tax (TVQ) may be available to:

- / sponsors of foreign conventions
- organizers of foreign conventions, including incentive houses, who are not registered for GST/HST

WHAT EXPENSES ARE ELIGIBLE FOR THE REBATE?

- / convention facilities, such as accommodations, meeting room rental, etc.
- related convention supplies such as audio-visual, business equipment, convention materials, convention show services, DMCs, electrical services, food, beverages, and catering services (50%), memorabilia, moving services, on-site services, printed matter, professional services (ex: customs brokerage), simultaneous interpretation equipment, speakers and educational seminars, telecommunications, translators and interpreters, transportation services between venues.

NON-RESIDENT, NON-REGISTERED EXHIBITOR AT ANY CONVENTION

WHAT EXPENSES ARE ELIGIBLE FOR THE REBATE?







PLACES TO CELEBRATE CITY-WIDE

What do you feel like tonight? Ways to celebrate in Montréal are infinitely wide-ranging, but everyone agrees on a few things. The weekend? It starts on Thursday evening with our 5 à 7, a chic, Montréal-specific take on happy hour. That's when you'll see people of all stripes and colours—the office crowd, university students, artists, blue collar workers and the city's many visitors—converging in restaurants and bars for a cocktail.

From there, the night's pursuits are bright with possibility: checking out an art exhibit, soaking up some live music, going to a dance or comedy show, trying out a buzzed-about restaurant, living it up at a festival, or catching a professional sports game (football, soccer or hockey) are among the dazzling array of choices. Montréal, of course, never tucks in early: in fact, many restaurants offer special menus for the late-night crowds, while after-hours clubs keep the party going well into the morning.

USEFUL TIPS ABOUT MONTRÉAL TO HELP YOU PLAN YOUR TRIP



CAN I USE MY CELL/MOBILE PHONE IN CANADA?

Your cellular phone will work in Canada, however, to avoid potentially expensive roaming charges, it is strongly recommended that you turn off your data before landing on Canadian soil. Montreal has hundreds of free Wi-Fi connections in the city, not to mention hotels, the convention centre, along with restaurants and cafés, so there is no reason for visitors to incur additional charges with their cell phone carrier.



BANKS, CURRENCY EXCHANGE AND TAXES

Canadian currency is the dollar, which is divided into 100 cents. There are 5, 10, 20, 50, and 100 dollar bills.

There are numerous currency exchange offices for visitors to exchange money into Canadian currency. Most exchange offices are open during regular business hours (9am-6pm) and Saturday from 10am-5pm. Credit cards are also widely accepted in restaurants, stores, taxis, etc. Taxes in Montréal are calculated as follows: a 5% Federal Goods & Services tax and a 9.975% Provincial Goods & Services tax. Only basic groceries (breads, dairy, fruits, vegetables, etc.) are not taxed. Taxes paid by visitors are not reimbursable.excitement about the destination.



WHAT IS THE RULE FOR TIPPING IN MONTRÉAL?

Service is not included in restaurants, so it is customary to add a 15% tip to the total before taxes. For larger groups (from 6 people or more, some restaurants will automatically add the 15% service to the bill.

Taxi drivers, hairdressers, etc. are also normally tipped 15%.

For bellhops, porters, doormen, etc. between \$1-\$2 is considered standard. Housekeeping standards are between \$1-\$2 per day. Many people simply round of the amount; for example, if you are staying 4 nights, a \$10 gratuity would be considered as very nice, but not excessive.



ELECTRICITY

The electric current is 110V and the plugs are the same as what is found in the US. If you come from a country that uses 220V electricity, you will need an adaptor (for computers, cell phones, tablets / iPads, cameras etc.) or a converter (to transform voltage- for your hairdryer, electric shavers etc.)

WHAT LANGUAGE IS SPOKEN IN MONTRÉAL?

FRENCH IS QUÉBEC'S OFFICIAL LANGUAGE BUT ENGLISH IS WIDELY SPOKEN IN MONTRÉAL.

The city has more than 120 cultural groups and over 20% of population speaks three languages. It is common that you will be addressed in French, but people will quickly speak English when asked.



WISHING TO SEND A POSTCARD BACK TO YOUR LOVED ONES?

For regular mail/postcards (30 grams and less), stamps cost \$1.15 within Canada, \$1.38 to the US and \$2.88 for international destinations. For more details visit www.canadapost.ca.

Consult your hotel concierge to find the closest outlet to you. Some hotels will sell stamps and mail the letter for their guests. You might also find stamps at convenient stores.



SHOPPING IN MONTRÉAL

Most shops are open Monday to Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Thursday to Friday from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. They are usually closed on legal holidays – and on January 2 in the majority of cases – but some establishments (supermarkets, SAQ outlets, etc.) may still be open. TIME ZONES

Montréal switches to Eastern Daylight Time (summer time zone) on the second Sunday of March and returns to Eastern Standard Time (winter time zone) on the first Sunday of November. The time difference between Montréal time and Greenwich Mean Time (GMT) is less than 5 hours in the winter.
